JANUARY 14, 2016**

The meeting of the STARRS Board of Directors was called to order at 11:30 a.m. at City of St. Louis Fire Headquarters, 1421 N. Jefferson, St. Louis, Missouri, with attendance as follows:

**CALL TO ORDER**

Abe Cook, Chair, called the meeting to order.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF DECEMBER 17, 2015 MEETING**

Motion was made by Frank Arnoldy, seconded by Debbie Beezley, to approve the minutes of the December 17, 2015 meeting. The Motion passed unanimously.

**DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**All Ready Organizational Population Survey**

John Posey, East-West Gateway Council of Governments, reported on the results of the All Ready Organization Survey conducted by the consultant MDavis, Inc. and analyzed by the East-West Gateway research staff. Information gleaned from the survey will be used to assess and address disaster preparedness levels of organizations including businesses, churches, schools and non-profit organizations. In summary, the survey indicated the following: many organizations underestimate public response times; schools and larger organizations have the highest levels of preparedness while churches have the lowest; most organizations have a written plan in place; and about half the organizations have supplies set aside. Mr. Posey noted that a written report summarizing results of the All Ready St. Louis General Population and Organization surveys will be distributed in the very near future.

Additional discussion followed requesting the types of schools polled for the survey.

## **FEMA Region VII THIRA Report**

Rodney Butts, FEMA Region VII, National Preparedness Division, reported on how the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA) is developed and used towards achieving a National Preparedness Goal for informing whole communities, including all levels of government, on how to understand risks and estimate capabilities. He summarized the four step risk assessment process relevant to identifying threats and hazards, desired outcomes, capability targets and resources required to achieve those targets.

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, noted the importance of putting together a comprehensive THIRA that is broad enough to address ongoing and future needs in the region.

## **ACTION ITEMS**

### **Regional Security Expenditures**

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, summarized staff's recommendation of the following expenditures, totaling \$321,304. The expenditures will be funded from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Area Security Initiative ("UASI") grant program.

Motion approving the recommendation was made by Warren Robinson, seconded by Gary Christmann. Motion passed unanimously.

## **OTHER BUSINESS**

Gary Christmann voiced his concerns about the growing inability of committees to meet quorums due to their growing sizes and nonattendance by some members. He noted that STARRS By-laws allow for the removal of perpetually absent members from committees.

Nick Gragnani encouraged committees to reaffirm or nominate new Category C Board members by the Annual Meeting, which is held in conjunction with the February 11, 2016 Board meeting. He also requested nominations to fill the Secretary vacancy, who must be chosen from a Category A or B Board member.

Mr. Gragnani requested e-mail feedback, positive or not, about how the various STARRS products, equipment, planning, etc. was used during the recent flood event. STARRS staff will be developing an after action report that will outline the various flood response capabilities and make recommendations on improvements and identify resource shortfalls.

## **NEXT MEETING & ADJOURNMENT**

The next STARRS Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 11, 2016, at 11:30 a.m., in the auditorium of St Louis City Fire Headquarters.

Subject: FY 2014 UASI Unspent Funds Reallocation  
Date: November 8, 2016

Staff was recently advised that funding remains from the FY 2014 UASI grant budget. Because the grant funding period deadline is approaching, staff called a meeting of the STARRS Finance Committee to review the budget, the pending projects from the Force Comparison Worksheet, and make a recommendation on the redistribution of the remaining \$457,000 from the FY 2014 UASI grant budget.

The STARRS Finance Committee met on Monday, February 08, 2016 via telephone conference call and reviewed the availability of the FY 2014 UASI funding and the Force Comparison score sheet which contained the pending FY 2014 funding projects. After review of all documentation and discussion the Finance Committee recommends the \$457,000 be redistributed as follows:

- the purchase of 15 Tactical Medic Armor; 28 Tactical Medic Communications Helmets; 12 Medium Threat Vests; and, 24 Ballistic Helmets without Communications in an amount not to exceed \$107,000;
- the purchase of five Hazmat Gas/Vapor FTIR ID meters in an amount not to exceed \$350,000; and,
- if any funding still remains it should be allocated to additional EMS Ballistic Helmets and Vests purchases for the St. Louis Regional EMS Taskforce.

**Staff Recommendation:** Staff recommends the approval of the STARRS Finance Committee action as recommended on the attached.

Subject: Regional Security Expenditures

Date: February 8, 2016

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) and the Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response (ASPR) Hospital Preparedness grant programs. Attachment A summarizes these purchases totaling **\$468,807**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

1. **Ballistic Protection Equipment** – We are requesting approval to purchase the following ballistic protection equipment for the St Louis Regional Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Task Force and law enforcement tactical operations personnel in support of active shooter situations involving mass casualty incidents.
  - **16 Ballistic Helmets** – For the St. Clair County, Illinois Sheriff's Department. Total cost will not exceed **\$10,939**
  - **28 Ballistic Helmets** – For the St. Louis Regional EMS Taskforce. Total cost will not exceed **\$41,698**
  - **27 Ballistic Vests** – For the St. Louis Regional EMS Taskforce. Total cost will not exceed **\$64,542**
  - **85 Ballistic Vests** – 18 for the Franklin County Sheriff's Department; 25 for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department; and, 42 for the St. Charles County Police Department. Total costs will not exceed **\$213,346**
  
2. **Hospital Emergency Communications** – In 2015 staff received approvals to purchase desktop and portable handheld radios for the Missouri hospitals in the St. Louis region. These interoperable radios will be used by hospital emergency departments and incident command centers to coordinate regional emergency events with the St. Louis Medical Operations Center, local EMS and county emergency management agencies, as well as various regional partners. These radios will function on the St. Louis Area Regional Truck Radio (SLATER) system. In order to have this capability, each radio must be programmed with the proper radio frequencies by the St. Louis County approved vendor, WirelessUSA. Programming will include radio talk group and control functionality assignments, and software upgrades that are necessary for the radio to operate on the SLARTR network.

Therefore, we are requesting approval to expend funds to support the programming of 178 radios to function on the SLATER network. Total cost will not exceed **\$35,000**.

Funds for this purchase will come from the Missouri ASPR grant program which cannot be used in Illinois. However, the Illinois hospitals receive ASPR funding from the Illinois Department of Health and have purchased similar radios for their hospitals and associated healthcare response partners.

- 3. Responder Force Protection & Rehabilitation Unit** – This unit is used by the St. Louis Regional EMS Task Force when responding to a mass casualty incident. It provides medical evaluation and specialized assessments and services for emergency responders at the scene of prolonged events or during extreme weather conditions. One unit is currently staged in Illinois with St. Clair County Special Emergency Services in Belleville, Illinois. We are requesting approval to procure a second unit that will be staged with the Christian Hospital in North St. Louis County. This purchase includes a trailer and tow vehicle. Total cost will not exceed **\$103,283**.

The purchases described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

**Staff Recommendation:** Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- for the purchase of 16 Ballistic Helmets for the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department from Safeware Inc. in an amount not to exceed **\$10,939**;
- for the purchase of 28 Ballistic Helmets for the St. Louis Regional EMS Task Force from Safeware Inc. in an amount not to exceed **\$41,698**;
- for the purchase of 27 Ballistic Vests for the St. Louis Regional EMS Task Force from First Spear in an amount not to exceed **\$64,542**;
- for the purchase of 85 Ballistic Vests for the Franklin and Jefferson County Sheriff's Departments and the St. Charles County Police Department from First Spear in an amount not to exceed **\$213,346**;
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with WirelessUSA for the programming of 178 hospital radios in an amount not to exceed **\$35,000**;

- for the purchase of a Ford F350 truck from Reuther Ford Inc for an amount not to exceed **\$71,218**;
- for the purchase of a custom trailer from Veteran Corps of America for an amount not to exceed **\$32,065**; and,

for a total amount not to exceed **\$468,807** from the UASI and the ASPR Hospital Preparedness grant program.

Kyle holds a Master of Science in Biosecurity and Disaster Preparedness from Saint Louis University, with a concentration in Infection Control, and a Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice from Lindenwood University.

### **Training and Exercise**

**Sitzes, Rikki, Emergency Response Planner, St. Louis County Department of Health** - Rikki recently joined St. Louis County's Health Department as an Emergency Response Planner. A graduate from Washington University, she received her Masters of Public Health in 2014. Among her many trainings, she has received instruction in ICS-100, ICS-120, ICS-400, and IS-800. In her short time with the health department, she has participated in four exercises including the Hospital SMOC Exercise in May 2015 and a tabletop on the West Lake Landfill, June 2015. Rikki is a representative for the CDCS, DPH Quality Control Council, an MRC member with the St. Louis Regional Radiological Response, and a Disaster Services Volunteer for the American Red Cross.

### **Subcommittee Removals/Resignations**

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Ms. Joann Leykam, Chairperson called the meeting to order at 3:05 PM. The meeting began with a discussion of the EMS Sub-Committee's request for ballistic vests and helmets for the EMS Strike Teams. The discussion centered on fulfilling the EMS Sub-Committee's funding request before expending funds on other projects like the HazMat Gas/Vapor FTIR ID meters or the RAE Rapid Deployment Kit for the Unified Command Vehicle.

Chief Mark Thorp explained the EMS Sub-Committee's priority list with respect to purchases and the number one priority was to purchase ballistic helmets and vests for the region's EMS Strike Teams. Chief Thorp further explained the purpose of the helmets and vests and that the items were for the recognized strike teams in Missouri and the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) and for a cache of equipment to be staged. He indicated that the materials would not be distributed to any state employees for the IL team, only for the local police agencies. Mark stated that the priority was to purchase: 12 medium threat vests, 24 non-communication helmets, 15 high threat vests, and 28 communication helmets. The estimated cost of these items is approximately \$107,000.

David Todd made a motion to purchase 12 medium threat vests, 24 non-communication helmets, 15 high threat vests, and 28 communication helmets for a total of up to \$107,000. Abe Cook seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

David Todd made a motion to not fund the RAE Rapid Deployment Kit for the Unified Command Vehicle and to fund up to 5 Hazmat Gas/Vapor FTIR ID meters for a total of \$350,000. Greg Brown seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The Finance Committee discussed the other 2014 projects that had unspent funds (i.e. Fusion Center equipment and training). Leah Hummert explained that the Fusion Center equipment had unspent funds because the Fusion Center had several subscriptions that were cancelled because the subscription time frame extended beyond the grant period. The Fusion Center training was less than originally

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budgeted because the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department did not turn in invoices for its training, so the purchase orders had to be cancelled.

The Finance Committee discussed whether there were other projects that could be funded and put on a "back-up" list in case other 2014 purchases come in cheaper than anticipated. Nick Gragnani emphasized that projects need to be "shovel ready" given the limited amount of time available in the 2014 grant. Leah Hummert also reminded the Finance Committee that the spending plan for the 2014 grant is due to the Missouri Office of Homeland Security (MoOHS) on February 29, 2016 and after this date MoOHS will not permit us to change the budget.

The Finance Committee discussed the feasibility of purchasing more vests and helmets for the EMS Strike Teams. Chief Thorp indicated that even after the \$107,000 purchase, the teams would require additional materials, especially helmets. He also stated that if the teams do increase membership to 16 members rather than 12, then the teams would need more vests and helmets above and beyond what has already been purchased and the future \$107,000 purchase. He indicated that the first priority would be helmets followed by vests.

Mark Thorp made a motion to expend any remaining 2014 funds on ballistic helmets first and then, if funds are available, on ballistic vests for the EMS Strike Teams. David Todd seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mark Thorp stated he would get Leah Hummert the sizes for the high threat vests and that he had already sent the sizes for the medium threat vests.

David Todd made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Greg Brown seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned.
