**CALL TO ORDER**

Gary Christmann, Chair, called the meeting to order.

**AWARD PRESENTATION**

Gary Christmann presented Abe Cook with a plaque commemorating Mr. Cook's tenure as President over the past year.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MARCH 17, 2016 MEETING**

Motion was made by Joann Leykam, seconded by Frank Arnoldy, to approve the minutes of the March 17, 2016 meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

**DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**Executive Director's Report**

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, summarized and described the contents of the Board handbooks distributed. He noted that staff would be providing an updated version on a yearly basis.

He also provided a breakdown of US House Bill 4509 - the State and High Risk Urban Area Working Group Act, which would direct those receiving Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) or Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) grants to establish a working group or committee to determine funding priorities, prepare and revise homeland security plans, and assess risks to the regions where grants are awarded. He noted that STARRS working groups in existence are already in line with language contained in the legislation except for representation from secondary elementary education, which is being addressed.

### **St. Louis Regional Hospital Preparedness Grant Update**

John Whitaker, STARRS, provided the background and summary of the Hospital Preparedness Program (“HPP”) grant, which supports: (a) enhancements of infrastructure to improve the state, local, and territorial infrastructures that help hospitals and healthcare systems prepare for public health emergencies; (b) a capability based approach to planning to enhance healthcare system planning and response at the State, local, regional and territorial levels; and (c) coalitions that serve as a multi-agency coordinating groups that assist Emergency Management and Emergency Support Function (ESF) #8 with preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation activities related to healthcare organization disaster operations. He advised that for 2015, the State of Missouri received \$421,797 of the \$255 million that was available nationwide. His summary included a description of equipment purchased and proposed project areas for 2015 and the current year. He noted that the HPP grant aligns with the Public Health Emergency Preparedness grant and also complements the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP).

**Medical Emergency Response Cache**

Staci Alvarez, EWGCOG, summarized staff’s recommendations to authorize the Executive Director to: (a) approve payment of STARRS funds to East-West Gateway Council of Governments for consultant costs associated with the cache inventory and assessment, in an amount not to exceed \$120,000; and (b) to execute an updated cooperative agreement with East-West Gateway Council of Governments, outlining its relationship with STARRS, specifically the cooperation between the two entities, the fiscal agency and related costs, and other expenditures by East-West Gateway Council of Governments at STARRS’s request.

Motion approving the recommendation was made by Greg Brown, seconded by Debbie Beezley. Motion passed, with the exception of Joann Leykam who opposed the expenditure.

**Regional Security Expenditures**

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, summarized staff’s recommendation of the following expenditures, totaling \$540,390. The expenditures will be funded from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security’s Urban Area Security Initiative (“UASI”) and the U.S. Department of Health and Senior Services, Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response (ASPR) grant programs.

## **CCTA Program Overview**

**Purpose:** The Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attacks (CCTA) Program will provide funding for jurisdictions to build a sustainable preparedness approach for addressing complex, coordinated attacks in collaboration with the whole community. The whole community includes individuals and communities, the private and nonprofit sectors, faith-based organizations, and all levels of government (local, regional/metropolitan, state, tribal, territorial, insular area, and Federal). The program will provide needs-based support to jurisdictions as they confront the evolving and dynamic terrorism threat the Intelligence Community has identified as shifting from symbolic, highly planned Al-Qaeda style attacks, to attacks that could occur in any jurisdiction across the Homeland, at any time, similar to those that occurred in Mumbai, India, and as recently seen in Paris, France and Brussels Belgium, with multiple actors and multiple targets. Selected jurisdictions will receive funding to review and enhance plans, develop and implement training, and conduct exercises to identify opportunities for additional corrective action. The goal is to institutionalize the program within the jurisdiction, as well as to produce lessons learned, best practices, and other materials that can be shared with other jurisdictions to support their efforts. The program will leverage existing data to review and enhance existing planning efforts, develop training, and carry out exercises to address identified gaps and lessons learned, such as those identified through the Joint Counterterrorism Awareness Workshop Series (JCTAWS). In addition FEMA has engaged whole community partners such as organizations that are members of the National Homeland Security Consortium (NHSC), the Homeland Security Advisors through the Governors Homeland Security Advisory Council, as well as national associations which represent tribal nations.

**Eligibility:** All local governments, the 56 states and territories (which includes any state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands), and all Federally recognized Native American tribal governments are eligible to apply for FY 2016 Complex Coordinated Terrorists Attack Program funds.

Multiple jurisdictions may choose to partner on the effort and submit a “regional” application (for example, neighboring jurisdictions, a city and county, a city and state).

Only one application will be accepted from each jurisdiction.

**Funding:** \$39M will be used to directly support program recipients. Of that, \$2M will be used to provide direct Technical Assistance to aid recipients in addressing gaps and challenges, where needed.

**Allocation:** Funding will be awarded on a competitive basis. Jurisdictions will be able to apply for a specified cap used on eligible activities that will include but not be limited to planning, training, and exercises. Equipment and construction are not allowable costs.

**Period of Performance:** Recipients will be provided 36 months to complete their projects.

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant program. Attachment A summarizes these purchases totaling **\$396,321**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

- 1. Ballistic Protection Equipment** – We are requesting approval to purchase the following ballistic protection and tactical communications equipment for the St Louis Regional Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Task Force and law enforcement tactical operations units.
  - **24 Ballistic Helmets** – For the St. Louis Regional EMS Taskforce. Total cost will not exceed **\$14,715**
  - **25 Ballistic Vests** – For the St. Louis County Police Department. Total cost will not exceed **\$52,134**
  - **28 Tactical Communications Headsets** – For the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. Total cost will not exceed **\$21,194**
  
- 2. Metro Air Support Unit Cockpit Flight Display Systems** - We are requesting approval to purchase new flight display Systems for two of the Metro Air Support Unit's aircrafts. The Federal Aviation Administration is requiring that all aircraft operating in controlled airspace (i.e., Lambert International, Spirit of St. Louis and Downtown airports in St. Louis region) have an Automatic Dependent Surveillance-Broadcast system by 2020. Additionally, there is a need to add updated flight displays to the Unit's aircrafts so they will be compatible of being operated by pilots wearing Night Vision Goggles. These modifications will improve the Unit's response capabilities and the overall safety of the flight crew by enhancing the flight crews' ability to avoid severe weather, ground obstructions such as radio towers, and help with situational awareness through the use of a high resolution vision display that provides the crew with better images of the landscape around them. Total cost will not exceed **\$175,000**.

- 3. Network Video Cameras** – Recent events have shown that surveillance cameras play a critical role in protecting urban areas while providing law enforcement with on-site situational awareness. Having complete, accurate and up-to-the-minute real time situational awareness is essential for law enforcement when identifying suspicious vehicles, individuals and/or items at key sites and during major events.

We are requesting approval to purchase six high definition networking capable video cameras along with the necessary operating software and support hardware for the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department (SLMPD). This purchase will provide the SLMPD with the capability to stream back images to the Department's Real Time Crime Center (RTCC). Commissioned officers assigned to the RTCC will control the cameras from SLMPD Headquarters. This is critically important during special events such as Fair St. Louis, where fixed deployment locations can be utilized and cameras remotely monitored and controlled within the RTCC. Total cost will not exceed **\$20,778**

- 4. WebEOC** - We are requesting approval to enter into a contract with Intermedix/ESi to continue use of the regional WebEOC disaster incident management system. WebEOC provides the region's Emergency Operations Centers with an online tool capable of sharing situational status messages real time with other EOCs in the region. The system also provides an emergency resource management system and resource requesting capabilities. Additionally, the regional WebEOC system is linked to the State of Missouri Emergency Management Agency's WebEOC system allowing the interchange of information and provides a method to request additional resources from the State. A similar link will be created with the State of Illinois' WebEOC system once their system becomes available. Total cost will not exceed **\$112,500**.

The purchases described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

**Staff Recommendation:** Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- for the purchase of 24 Ballistic Helmets for the St. Louis Regional EMS Task Force from Botach Tactical, Inc. in an amount not to exceed **\$14,715;**
- for the purchase of 25 Ballistic Vests for the St. Louis County Police Department from First Spear, LLC in an amount not to exceed **\$52,134;**
- for the purchase of 28 Tactical Communications Headsets for the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department from Ed Roehr Safety Products in an amount not to exceed **\$21,194;**



- for the purchase and installation of two Cockpit Flight Display Systems for the Metro Air Support Unit aircraft from Jefferson City Flying Service in an amount not exceed **\$175,000;**
- for the purchase of six High Definition Network Capable Video Cameras along with necessary operating software and support hardware consisting of camera mounting bases and cables from Veteran Corps of America in an amount not to exceed **\$20,778**
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Intermedix/ESi for the regional use of the WebEOC system in an amount not to exceed **\$112,500;**

for a total amount not to exceed **\$396,321** from the UASI grant program.

Emergency Medical Services

**Mark Flauter, Deputy Chief/Chief Medical Officer, Florissant Valley Fire Protection District** -Mark Flauter is the Chief Medical Officer for the Florissant Valley Fire District. Mark has been employed by the Florissant Valley Fire District since February 2000. He served as a Firefighter/Paramedic for the district until his promotion to Chief Medical Officer in May 2006. As the Chief Medical Officer, Mark is responsible for the overall administration and management of the district's Emergency Medical Services and reports directly to the Fire Chief. Mark holds an Associate in Applied Sciences Degree in Paramedic Technology from the St. Louis Community College. Mark is a Pre Hospital Trauma Life Support Instructor, an American Heart Association Instructor in Basic Life Support, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, & Pediatric Advanced Life Support, an Advanced Stroke Life Support Instructor through the University of Miami, and a certified EMS Instructor through the National Association of EMS Educators. Mark is also a member of the National Association of Emergency Medical Services Educators, Missouri Emergency Medical Services Association, the Greater St. Louis Region Fire-EMS Officers Association, the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians, National EMS Management Association, and the International Association of Fire Chiefs, Emergency Medical Services Section.

Mass Fatality

**Roger Smith, Chief Deputy Coroner, Madison County Coroner's Office** - Roger Smith was promoted to Supervisory Investigator in 1996 and Chief Investigator in 2006, directing eight career investigators and 41 reserve deputy coroners. In 2010, Smith was promoted to Chief Deputy Coroner. His duties include oversight and case management of the investigation of

sudden and mysterious deaths resulting from such causes as acts of homicide and suicide, medical misadventures, traffic fatalities, and deaths occurring outside clinical setting. Administrative duties include formulation and maintenance of mass casualty/disaster plan, organization of training activities, supply and equipment acquisition, internal and pre-employment background investigations, policy formulation, recommendation, and implementation, assisting in the budgeting process, and system administrator for reports and files data system.
