The meeting of the STARRS Board of Directors was called to order at 11:30 a.m. at the City of St. Louis Fire Headquarters, 1421 N. Jefferson, St. Louis, Missouri, with attendance as follows:

CALL TO ORDER

Gary Christman, Chair, called the meeting to order.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 15, 2016 MEETING

Motion was made by Debbie Beezley, seconded by Frank Arnoldy, to approve the minutes of the September 15, 2016 meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Executive Director's Report

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, provided updates on the current UASI grants. He reported that the 2015 grant is complete, except for some expected washout funds, totals of which will be available sometime in March. For FY2016, he advised that expenditure requests are still required from the various committees, which he detailed. He noted that the deadline to provide the requested information is March 31, 2017.

Mr. Gragnani also provided information about the upcoming FY2017 grant, noting that Congress is currently operating under a Continuing Resolution that is due to expire on April 28, 2017. He provided an e-mail communication from the Department of Homeland Security explaining the

compressed timeframe for announcing the grants due to the Continuing Resolution, and providing information about the shortened application period for grant applications. He advised Committees to begin work on their investment justifications in light of the impending quick turnaround time.

Mr. Gragnani advised that the deadline for nominating Category C Directors is January 13, 2017. He requested that Committees provide the minutes from their respective meeting and sign-up sheet to verify their nominee, who is required to have attended at least half of the meetings the prior year. He also requested nominations for Board officers, noting that Category C Directors are not eligible. All nominations will be approved at the February 9, 2017 Board meeting.

Mr. Gragnani provided information about the Incident Command System (ICS) training courses for elected officials being sponsored by STARRS. He summarized some of the upcoming sessions, noting that the sessions are filling to capacity quickly.

He also summarized information concerning an Integrated Emergency Management 4-day course being scheduled for early fall sometime which will address and assess the region's response to and capability in a complex coordinated terrorist attack. The session will be open to approximately 70, location and exact date and time to be determined.

Presidential Debate Overview

Ryan Nicholls, Washington University, reported on the planning for, logistics of, and success of the Presidential Candidate Debate that occurred at Washington University on October 9, 2016.

Additional discussion followed regarding how credentialing was handled.

Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack

Dale Chambers, STARRS, briefed the Board regarding the grant application process for the Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack grant funding announcement. He advised that the grant is a one-time competitive grant for \$2.5M maximum funding per applicant, with an objective of building and sustaining the capabilities of jurisdictions for complex coordinated terrorist attacks through gap analysis and identification and training. Nick Gragnani noted that the grant is to enhance and sustain current capabilities. He added that he was optimistic about the region receiving a grant.

Regional Security Expenditures

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, summarized staff's recommendation of the following expenditures, totaling \$416,277. The expenditures will be funded from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Area Security Initiative ("UASI") and the Assistant Secretary and Preparedness Response ("ASPR") Hospital Preparedness grant programs.

Subject: Regional Security Expenditures

Date: February 6, 2017

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant program. Attachment A summarizes this purchases totaling **\$472,175**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

1. **St. Louis Regional Digital Microwave Network Connection to the Missouri Statewide Interoperability Network** – The goal of the St. Louis Regional Digital Microwave Network was to create a regional communications backbone that would support all forms of communications while supporting local emergency response initiatives as well as statewide responses in Missouri and Illinois. The microwave network was completed in 2015 and now supports local land mobile communications in the City of St. Louis, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, St. Clair, St. Charles and St. Louis Counties. The next phase of the network's design is to create a link with both the Illinois Starcom 21 and the Missouri Statewide Interoperability Network (MOSWIN), thus improving interoperable communications capabilities across the region by supporting connectivity between the regional land mobile radio systems and statewide radio networks.

Therefore, we are requesting approval to enter into a sub-award agreement with St. Charles County, Missouri to add an additional microwave link to the St. Louis Regional Digital Microwave Network that will link the existing St. Charles County tower site located on Highway 94 south of I-64 to the existing State of Missouri tower site in Weldon Springs, Missouri; thus linking the St. Louis Regional network with MOSWIN. Total cost will not exceed **\$200,000**. No additional link is needed to connect to the Illinois network, as the existing link is part of the microwave networks in Madison, Monroe and St. Clair Counties.

2. **Law Enforcement Tactical Robots** – We are requesting approval to purchase five (5) Mini-Caliber Tactical Robots for the Jefferson and Franklin County Sheriff's Departments, the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department and the St. Charles and St. Louis County Police Departments. These small size remote operated robots were developed for law enforcement tactical missions. They contain a rotating manipulator arm with a 10x zoom camera and can

fit down the aisles of buses, trains and airplanes, climb stairs and rough terrain. Total cost will not exceed **\$272,175**.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- allow the Executive Director to enter into a sub-award agreement with St. Charles County, Missouri to establish a microwave link between the St. Louis regional microwave network and the State of Missouri's MOSWIN network in Weldon Springs, Missouri for an amount not to exceed **\$200,000**; and,
- for the purchase of five Mini-Caliber SWAT Robots from ICOR Technologies, Incorporated in an amount not to exceed **\$272,175**,

for a total amount not to exceed **\$472,175** from the UASI grant program.

These teams are capable of responding to terrorist attacks, industrial accidents or natural disasters like earthquakes and tornadoes. Another element of critical response includes medical supplies for mass casualty incidents. The MCI trailers represent the first stage of meeting this need for the EMS community. Also included is equipment for Incident Management Teams that will consist of emergency responders from all disciplines.
